Safely handle used motor oil

- Do not mix used motor oil with anything.
- Keep clean-up materials such as rags, sand or kitty litter close at hand.
- Contain spilled oil by spreading kitty litter or other clean-up material over and around the used motor oil.
- Buy and maintain reusable clean-up materials when possible.
- Remove used motor oil from rags or other clean-up materials and recycle the motor oil as you normally would.
- Put used cleaning materials in the trash when they do not contain any free-flowing oil and when they can no longer be reused or recycled.

Properly store used motor oil

- **Put used oil in a clean, leak-proof container with a tight-fitting lid**
Never store used oil in a container that once held bleach, cleaners, other chemicals and automobile fluids.
- **Do not mix used motor oil with anything**
Store oil separately from solvents and chemicals.
- **Label all containers as "Used Motor Oil"**
- **Keep containers in good condition**
Don't allow containers to leak or deteriorate.
- **Store used motor oil in safe areas away from children and pets**
- **Place used oil containers inside a larger container to capture any leaks or spills**

How to recycle your used oil

If you change your own motor oil, please recycle it. Recycling your oil helps protect Puget Sound, saves energy and protects our drinking water supplies.

Did you know?

Used oil from one oil change can contaminate 1 million gallons of fresh water – a year's supply for 50 people.

Used motor oil is:

- Toxic and contains harmful chemicals
- Slow to degrade
- Sticks to everything from beach sand to bird feathers
- A major source of oil contamination of waterways and can pollute drinking water sources



1. **Drain**
Drain oil into a clean plastic, leak-proof container with a tight-fitting lid. Do not spill any oil on the ground.
2. **Contain**
Never put used oil in a container that once held chemicals or other automobile fluids.
3. **Do not mix**
Oil contaminated with water, gasoline, antifreeze or hydraulic fluids can't be recycled.
4. **Recycle**
Take used motor oil to one of the locations on the list inserted in this brochure.

Accepted*

- Oil from residential motor use (vehicles, motorcycles, boats, lawn mower, etc.)
- Up to 5 gallons

Not accepted

- **Drums or barrels**
- **Oil filters and containers**
Puncture filters and drain for at least 24 hours before placing in the garbage. Or, you may take oil filters to the City of Tacoma Household Hazardous Waste Facility, where they will be recycled.
- **Contaminated oil**
- **Oil mixed with other substances** (gas, solvents, antifreeze, etc.)
- **Hazardous waste**
Take contaminated oil, oil mixtures, antifreeze, solvents, gas, brake fluid and other hazardous waste – free of charge – to:

Most sites are self-serve and you will empty your oil into the tank yourself. The amount of oil accepted varies by location. The City of Tacoma Recycling Center and Pierce County's transfer stations may accept larger volumes.
